WHAT CALCIUM POLYSTYRENE SULFONATE POWDER IS AND WHAT IT IS USED FOR | In particular, tell your doctor if you or your child are taking any of the following: <br> - Medicines that contain salts such as magnesium, potassium or calcium. Ask your doctor if you are not sure. <br> - Medicines for constipation (laxatives) that contain magnesium. <br> - Medicines for indigestion (antacids) that contain magnesium or aluminium. <br> - Digoxin or similar medicines from digitalis - for heart problems. <br> - Levothyroxine or thyroxine - for an under-active thyroid. <br> - Lithium - for mental illness. |
| Calcium Polystyrene Sulfonate $99.934 \% \mathrm{w} / \mathrm{w}$ powder for Oral/Rectal suspension (called Calcium Polystyrene Sulfonate powder in this leaflet) contains the active substance calcium polystyrene sulfonate. This belongs to a group of medicines called 'ion exchange resins'. | Pregnancy and breast-feeding <br> - If you are pregnant, might become pregnant, or think you are pregnant ask your doctor, pharmacist or nurse for advice before using this medicine. <br> - If you are breast-feeding ask your doctor for advice before using this medicine. |
| Calcium Polystyrene Sulfonate powder is used when you have too much potassium in your blood, a condition called 'hyperkalaemia'. It works by removing this extra potassium to bring your levels back to normal. It is often given to people who have kidney problems and people on dialysis. | using this medicine. <br> 3. | 2. WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE YOU TAKE | A doctor or nurse will usually give you this medicine. <br> You may be given this medicine by mouth or as an enema in your rectum (back passage). |

| Do not use Calcium Polystyrene Sulfonate powder and tell your doctor, pharmacist or nurse if: <br> - you are allergic to calcium polystyrene sulfonate or any of the other ingredients of this medicine (listed in section 6) <br> - you have a condition where the body fluids and tissues are unusually alkaline (metabolic or respiratory alkalosis) <br> - you have low levels of potassium in your blood <br> - you have a condition which results in high levels of calcium such as problems with your thyroid or some types of cancer <br> - your gut is blocked (obstructive bowel disease). | Your doctor will monitor you while you are taking this medicine and may adjust your dose. <br> Adults including the elderly By mouth (Oral) <br> - The usual dose is 15 g (one level scoop) 3-4 times a day. <br> - Each dose should be made up as a suspension in approximately $45-60 \mathrm{ml}$ of water or syrup (not fruit juice). <br> - Take each dose at least 3 hours before or 3 hours after any other oral medicines you may be taking.
